This President's Special Emphasis was Easter Seals; promoted through the Home Life Community Service Program Chairman. GFWC Illinois was honored on a recent Will County Easter Seals telethon during the 5:00 to 6:00 hour. Members from nine clubs answered



phones. This President and Director of Junior Clubs were also interviewed on television. GFWC Illinois was able to donate over \$2,500 during this administration.

GFWC Illinois State Project "Our Promise...A Safe Place for Every Child" which is a child abuse initiative has partnered with Prevent Child Abuse Illinois for over twenty years. For seventeen years GFWC Illinois has held a Blue Ribbon Luncheon and Fashion Show; this show generated around \$22,000 combined with clubs donations PCA Illinois received around \$40,000.

"Virtual Visits" had the GF Ohio President visiting clubs via SKYPE and Facetime. GFWC Ohio clubs volunteered 65,489 hours, donated \$309,820 and gave \$113,789 as in-kind donations the first year of the administration and volunteered 71,947 hours, raised and donated \$399,347 and gave \$195,762 in-kind during the second year.

Creating a Future One Seed at a Time

"Creating a Future One Seed at a Time" was the theme for the 2012-2014 Junior Administration. The Director of Junior Clubs Special Emphasis was Feeding America's Backpack Program and Shot@Life. Feeding America's Backpack program provides children in need with food over the weekend. These children would otherwise go hungry and on Monday would have a difficult time concentrating. Through the efforts of the GFWC Wisconsin Women, Feeding America and numerous other food pantries across Wisconsin received over 4,200 hours of volunteer service, \$10,343 cash, and \$10,418 of in-kind donations.



Shot@Life is the United Nations Foundation global effort to prevent childhood deaths by getting children worldwide vaccinated against the preventable diseases of polio, measles, diarrhea (rotavirus), and pneumonia. For every \$20 donated a child can be vaccinated for these four diseases and have a greatly improved chance of living. To date, the Wisconsin Juniors and Generals have donated \$2,520 to Shot@Life giving 126 children the opportunity to grow-up and contribute to the world! Both of these programs fit the Director of Junior Clubs theme of "Creating a Future One Seed at a Time"; one providing the seed of food to help the children grow and one providing vaccinations that will allow the children of the world to have a future.



I am proud to say I am a GFWC-Wisconsin Junior. I have enjoyed representing these women at all the GFWC regional and international events and I look forward to their future success while they continue "Living the Volunteer Spirit"!

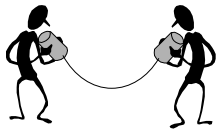
If It Needs To Be, Volunteers Are The Key

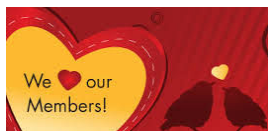
One Voice

service program requirements and clubs, but we know that a **GFWC Juniorette** club would not only give them the foundation of community volunteerism, but it would reward them with years of friendships as well.

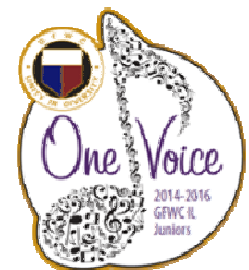

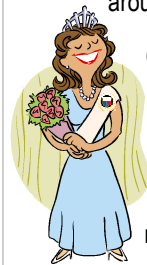
Busy GFWC Indiana Clubwomen

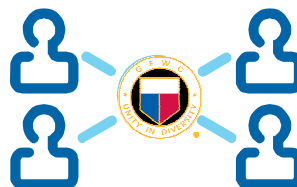

- Plant a tree in October for NeighborWoods® Month. <http://neighborwoodsmoonth.org/>

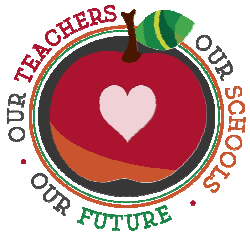

- Attend public student art displays, plays, concerts as part of a social event for your club. Purchase student art if it is offered for sale.
