From time to time, editors of our state magazine found it necessary to add "fillers" due to lack of submitted articles, articles that didn't quite fill out a column or spilled over into another but didn't leave room for another, or it was just something that the women had heard at another conference and thought it worthy of sharing. It could be a snappy saying, a poem, a recipe or food for thought. I found the following in the September, 1953 Issue of *The Buckeye Magazine* and thought it worth a repeat.

"There's a saying—

A lot of Clubwomen are like wheelbarrows – not good unless pushed.

Some are like canoes – they need to be paddled.

Some are like kites – if you don't keep a string on them, they fly away.

Some are like footballs – you can't tell which way they will bounce next.

Some are like balloons – full of wind and ready to blow up.

Some are like trailers – they have to be pulled.

Some are like a good watch – open face, pure gold, quietly busy and full of good works.

From the *Slovak Courier* – sent by Mrs. Kermit E. Grose"

From the December, 1942-January, 1943 issue:

"If we could only stretch our dollars as far as rayon hose stretch we would be alright."

"They say that waste fat is needed for nitroglycerin. Nitroglycerin goes into bombs. If the women could contribute all the fat they would like to get rid of, the war wouldn't last long."

Did you know that the Annual Club Officers form, most affectionately known to many as the Green Sheet, was once known as the Blue Slip? Several issues of the magazine had little spacers that said "Remember your Blue Slip". I wondered if this was some kind of fashion statement or for a skit at convention and then found an explanation of what a Blue Slip was. Someday I wonder if future clubwomen and historians will wonder why we had to collect green sheets. Was it for the homeless, or our troops, or maybe for animal shelters that lacked green grass.

And finally, from August-September, 1938: "Drudgery is as necessary to call out the treasures of the mind as harrowing and planting those of the earth." – Margaret Fuller.

Thank you for your generosity to the Junior Voluntary Fund and the Juniorette Donation Fund.



GFWC Ohio Director of Junior Clubs Special Emphasis "Circle of Life"

Early in 2014, GFWC Belpre Woman's Club Ways & Means Committee met for the first time to begin looking at projects to raise money and make improvements to existing projects.

In 1982, GFWC Belpre Woman's Club provided the means for the construction of a community .8 mile walking track at our Civitan Park, located next to the beautiful Ohio River. One of the most-used features of the community park, the walking track, needed to be repaired and re-surfaced. We accepted bids to see what exactly was ahead of us and just how we would cover the expense.

We contacted the local Kraton Performance Polymers to see if they could help us in some way. Much to our surprise they stepped forward, considered the bids with us, and told us to move forward with the project and they would cover the cost on behalf of the community.

Our Community Improvement Committee wanted to replace the original GFWC Belpre Woman's Club sign acknowledging the Club's part in constructing the walking track for Civitan Park. Kraton also funded replacement of the sign. It is now called the 'Fitness Track' and carries both the GFWC logo and the Kraton logo.

The Club acknowledged our appreciation for Kraton's support and presented them with a Certificate of Appreciation and framed photograph of the completed project at our annual Belpre Homecoming.



- Open to ALL GFWC Ohio Federation per capita members.
- Limited to (1) entry per year/per member.
- Must be written during the contest year (1/1/14-12/31/14)
- Essay winner from previous year is not eligible to win the award, but may submit an essay.
- Contestants may not re-submit the same essay the second year of the contest and the topic of the second year must be from a different aspect of the theme.
- No less than 300 words and no more than 600 words.
- Must be typed or word-processed double-spaced.
- Printed on one side 8 ½ x 11 paper with a cover page.
- If computer generated, use Times New Roman, size 12 font (or pica if typewritten).
- All essays must be postmarked no later than February 1, 2015.
- Essays will be judged at the state level by a panel of two or more people. The decision of the judges will be final.
- Judging Criteria:

Content	60%
Composition	20%
Following Instructions	20%

GFWC Ohio Scholarships

Support for education is a long-standing tradition and a core value of the GFWC/Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs. Each per capita club in Ohio is encouraged to sponsor 5 students for GFWC Ohio Scholarships, one per scholarship. Four of the scholarships are to be awarded to graduating high school seniors who will attend an accredited OHIO college: The Annette Phelps Lincoln Scholarship is designed for those interested in majoring in teaching or library science; students interested in studying in the field of applied health sciences can apply for the Ethel G. Swanbeck Scholarship; the Art Scholarship is appropriately intended for students interested in an Art major and those students who wish to study Communications may apply for the Elaine Weinman Memorial Scholarship. The fifth scholarship, the Clubwoman Scholarship, is to be awarded to a per capita club MEMBER who wishes to study or train at an accredited OHIO school in order to return to the workplace or enter the work force in order to better provide for herself and/or her family. The previous brief description does not include all the qualifications for the scholarships – see your GFWC Ohio Directory for ALL the important details.

Your club should appoint a Scholarship Chairman whose job is to communicate and coordinate with the student being sponsored and the high school guidance counselor (or similar school personnel) who works with students seeking scholarship aid. Your Scholarship Chairman will study the scholarship descriptions and requirements as outlined in the GFWC Ohio Directory and will work with the high school and student to make sure all steps are followed to ensure a successful application. Any questions should be directed to Sharon Pervo, Chairman of the Scholarship Trustees. **IMPORTANT!** a checklist is provided in the Directory – if the Scholarship Chairman uses that checklist then it is unlikely that your sponsored student will be disqualified due to missing information or qualifications. Your club should also designate a member, preferably the President, Scholarship Chairman or a member who knows the student, to write a letter of endorsement for her/him.

March 1 is the deadline for all scholarship applications and accompanying supplementary materials to be postmarked and sent to Sharon Pervo. All pertinent information is then studied by the Scholarship Trustees before they award the scholarships at the Annual Convention in April. The dollar amount to be awarded for each scholarship is determined in the Spring and is based on club donations, interest earned by the Scholarship accounts and other factors determined by the GFWC Ohio Board of Directors.
