### DECEMBER 2021 EVENT: TOYS FOR TOTS + "LOW INCOME VETERANS"

We received unwrapped toys and donation checks for the 2021 Toys for Tots Cape & Islands campaign sponsored by the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve. In addition, the Chapter presented a \$200.00 donation to Toys for Tots from the Charity Fund. Representing the Cape & Islands effort was former USMC Corporal **Rick Fatzer**.

The presentation by retired U.S. Marine Corps Major <u>Greg Quilty</u>, District Director, Department of Veterans' Services, Commonwealth of Massachusetts. His area serves Barnstable County on Cape Cod and a portion of Plymouth County. He explained the many services, some unique to Mass., offered to all veterans by the District's five offices and eight appointment locations. The focus was on the needs of veterans with little income including those who have difficulty accessing assistance from the Federal VA programs. Mass. alone in the nation has the only state-funded veterans assistance program with offices in every town. It alone provides town and state financial assistance with regular payments for low income veterans.

#### 12 APRIL 2022 EVENT - U.S. NAVAL WAR COLLEGE

The Naval War College (NWC), Newport RI, is one of the senior service institutions along with the Army War College, the Marine Corps War College, and the Air War College. Additionally, the U.S. Department of Defense operates the National War College. It considers itself the nation's oldest and most prestigious of these. NWC provides Masters degrees and fulfills joint professional military education requirements for more than 400 officers representing each of the six military services and several civilian agencies every year. The college was established in 1884 by Commodore Stephen B. Luce who was given the old building of the Newport Asylum for the Poor



to house it on Coasters Harbor Island in Narragansett Bay. That structure is now the college museum.

There are three schools within NWC. The College of Naval Command and Staff trains officers of O-5 level plus civilians of equivalent seniority from various federal agencies. It provides an initial opportunity for joint professional military education wherein students prepare for increased responsibilities. International students are included. The 13-month Maritime Advanced Warfighting School educates U.S. officers of all services to be operational planners and leaders who understand and can apply maritime power effectively. There is an emphasis on creative and critical thinking to develop solutions to complex, chaotic security problems. The College of Naval Warfare is for O-5/O-6 level officers. It provides students executive-level preparation for higher responsibilities as senior O-6 and junior flag officers. The NWC's leader since 2019 is RADM Shoshana S. Chatfield USN, first female NWC president. She was commissioned through Boston University's NROTC program and is a qualified helo pilot.

The U.S. Coast Guard sends a cadre of mid-grade and senior officers to the war college every year, as part of the service's long standing partnership with the Navy. The USCG Senior



Service Representative and a member of the faculty of the Joint Military Operations Department at NWC from 2017 to 2020 was **CAPT D. Eric Bader USCG**. Retired since June 2021, CAPT Bader is a senior analyst at Systems Planning and Analysis based in Alexandria VA which, for 49 years, has helped its clients inform decisions that have had and continue to have strategic and lasting impacts on national security.

When he retired, Bader was Chief of External Affairs, First Coast Guard District, Boston MA, where he had charge of all media engagements, intra-governmental and Congressional affairs, and public relations in an area spanning the Canadian

border to New York City. A career aviator, CAPT Bader was assigned as the Executive Officer at Air Station Cape Cod prior to the NWC tour. He has accumulated over 3,000 flight hours in the MH-60T helicopter while serving as an Instructor Pilot/Flight Examiner and duty standing aviator at three different Coast Guard Air Stations. He was previously assigned as the Department of Homeland Security Fellow on the U.S. Senate Appropriations Committee, and completed a staff assignment as the MH-60T Systems Manager in the Office of Aeronautical Engineering and Logistics (CG-41) at USCG headquarters. CAPT Bader graduated from the U.S. Coast Guard Academy in 1994 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Naval Architecture and Marine Engineering. Additionally, he holds a Master of Science degree in Operations Research from George Mason University, and is a registered Project Management Professional. He resides in Sandwich MA. Eric was last with us as guest speaker for the May 2019 Scholarship Awards event.

## <u>USS CONSTITUTION's First Woman CO</u> [by Kevin Lilley, MOAA.org 01-05-22 - edited]



The world's oldest commissioned warship still afloat has its first woman commanding officer. CDR Billie J. Farrell USN took over from CDR John Benda USN in a 21 Jan 22 change-of-command ceremony. Farrell becomes the 77th captain of USS CONSTITUTION, which was commissioned in 1797 and earned its "Old Ironsides" moniker during the War of 1812.

"I am honored to have the privilege to soon command this iconic warship that dates back to the roots of both our nation and our Navy and to have been afforded the amazing opportunity to serve as USS CONSTITUTION's first female commanding officer in her 224 years," Farrell said in a Jan. 4 news release announcing the change of command.

"I hope to strengthen the legacy of USS CONSTITUTION through preservation, promotion, and protection by telling her story and connecting it to the rich heritage of the United States Navy and the warships serving in the fleet today."

Farrell took command after serving as the executive officer aboard USS VICKSBURG (CG-69). Previous assignments included serving as the deputy director of professional development at the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis Md, and as the weapons officer aboard USS SAN JACINTO (CG-56). Farrell is a 2004 graduate of the USNA.

The ship's first woman sailor, Rosemarie Lanam, joined the crew in 1986, per the release. Its first commissioned officer, LCDR Claire V. Bloom USN, served as executive officer during its historic 1997 sail – the first time CONSTITUTION sailed under its own power in more than 100 years. She is open for visitors Wednesday through Sunday, 1000-1600, with virtual tours Mondays at 1300 and Sundays for morning and evening colors.
