Past State President, Shirley A. Mitchell, passes away



Shirley A. Mitchell (Wells), 77, of Wintersville, OH, passed away Monday, July 23, 2012, at Acuity Specialty Hospital.

Shirley was State President from 1990-1992; State Trustee Chairman of the Ohio Memorial Forest and Shrine; past President of the Steubenville Woman's Club; Treasurer of the Steubenville Woman's Club and Steubenville Big Red High School Alumni Association; and a member of the Woman's Advisory Board at Trinity Health System.

She was born Nov. 7, 1934, in Steubenville, OH, a daughter of the late George J. and Lillian A. Jenkins Wells.

Shirley was preceded in death by her beloved husband and closest friend of 56 years, Thomas A. "Mitch" Mitchell, whom she married on Oct. 15, 1955; and brother, Dohrman J. Wells. Surviving are two sons, Kevin T. (fiancée Tammy Burrell) Mitchell of Wintersville, OH, and Kenneth L. The dates are set for the second GFWC/Ohio trip to Washington DC and our GFWC Headquarters.

The tour will be leaving on Thursday, May 9, 2013 and will return on Sunday, May 12, 2013.

As Jackie Pierce, 2006-2008 GFWC International President said, "This is our home." We hope you can join us for our fabulous homecoming!

We're still working out some of the details, but here is a tentative agenda:

MAY 9, 2013 - THURSDAY

One coach departs Columbus, Ohio and makes its way along RT #70 for additional pickups in Cambridge and St. Clairsville/ Wheeling area. Lunch (probably at Mehlman's Cafeteria) and dinner near the hotel - on own.

MAY 10, 2013 - FRIDAY

After a tour of the Federation Headquarters Friday morning (this may be in the afternoon for the Mother's Tea), we will enjoy a guided tour of the Capitol. Afterwards, tour the Federal Triangle and tour of the exterior of the Capitol Building; then visit the Supreme Court and the Library of Congress. Visit the White House Visitor Center and enjoy photo opportunities of the White House and possible tour of the White House (they will not verify the White House tour until 2 months prior to the tour). From here, have dinner at a place still to be decided and included, we will meet our guide here for the Illuminated Monument Tour (WWII, Lincoln, Vietnam, Korean, Iwo Jima, Washington Monument, etc.). Drop our guide off and return to the motel for the night.

MAY 11, 2013 - SATURDAY

Visit Arlington Cemetery - You will tour here via Tour mobile, which will give you on-off opportunities to see the sights. Time your morning to see the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier (we are checking on the possibility of GFWC/ Ohio sponsoring the wreath to be laid at the tomb), and see the resting-places of JFK and Jackie Kennedy Onassis, Audie Murphy, Joe Louis and others. From here, travel to Mt. Vernon. Have lunch here at the food court, on your own, and then enjoy George Washington's home. Here you tour the house and grounds with gardens, slave quarters, the round barn and even the tomb of George and Martha. Depart here for Old Town Alexandria where you can take a walking tour, enjoy the waterfront area and enjoy dinner, all on your own. Return to the motel for the night.

MAY 12, 2013 - SUNDAY

Before heading home we will tour at least one of the Smithsonian Museums with lunch being provided on our way home. Return with some great memories of your trip to the Nation's Capitol.

There will be free breakfasts for Friday, Saturday, and Sunday at the hotel.

MEMORIAL FOREST & SHRINE REPORT

As you know, the Memorial Shrine in Mohican State Forest houses the two "Great Books" that have all of Ohio's war dead that were killed in war since WW II, written in calligraphy. We call them the Great Books because the closed books have solid ¹/₄ inch thick black walnut covers and the pages in these books are 26 inches by 22 inches. They are great in size and also great historical pieces of art.

At the 2011 State convention Shirley reported on the quote for purchasing one museum quality case to keep the Great Books in which the Board of Directors approved the funds at their 2011 Winter Board Meeting so we could order one case for \$5,250. The Mohican State Forest Manager, Tim Humphrey, who spoke at the State Convention, connected us to a foundation that wanted to do something in the forest for the shrine. NiSource Charitable Foundation which is associated with Columbia Gas sent me a lengthy grant application. Many documents had to be gathered including OFWC's annual budget, IRS status, project summary, and project evaluation qualitatively and quantitatively, and also what the community impact would be. They needed a list of our volunteer OFWC Board of Directors and a quote from Gaylord Brothers of Syracuse, New York for two cases as they insinuated they may be able to cover that cost. Actually last year during convention the staff here at the Doubletree faxed the last document to the foundation in Texas for me. And before the close of the business day in Texas, we got a phone call that they approved the \$10,600 grant. Two cases were ordered at no cost to the Ohio Federation. The first case was delivered in July and the second one was in place last year just before the Gold Star Mothers Pilgrimage in September. The Great Books each got a new home where they can both be displayed in the open position beneath a clear 20 inch tall vitrine dome.

Our next project which is well underway was to order additional pages for the Great Books from Dayton Legal Blank. Mr. Humphrey took one of the books directly to the company and they took photographs and measurements to create replicas of the pages. We have reviewed and rejected the first proof yesterday and waiting for the second proof. These pages are recognized as the National Standard for Permanent Records. They are 100% cotton with an alkaline chemistry and meet the Library of Congress standards for archival standards. The minimum number we had to order was 150 sheets and we hope and pray that we will not need them all. Also ordered were 150 Mylar sheet protectors with both being drilled to our specifications to fit the books.

The final cost for these materials is \$3022.50 that was approved by the Board at their January meeting. Because the cost for the cabinets was covered by the grant we were able to proceed with this purchase. We have many projects in the future so please keep the Memorial Shrine in your budgets for years to come.

The Board of Trustees for the Shrine: Shirley Mitchell, Chairman, Carol Buch from Canton; Mary Lou Butterworth from Marion, OFWC President Bachman of Bowling Green and Stephanie Rouse from Mingo Junction.

We were contacted this week by the Ohio Department of Veterans Services with one Army and three Army National Guard casualties to add to the list that were killed in the most recent suicide bombing and they are all from the Columbus area. One year ago Shirley reported the list contained 232 names and including these additions the number is now 257. Since March of 2003, 257 of our Service Members from the State of Ohio gave the supreme sacrifice in Operation Iraqi Freedom. (Stephanie does have a copy of all the names and hometowns if anyone is interested.) A special invitation is extended to all to attend the annual Gold Star Mothers Pilgrimage. It will be on September 30th with the ceremony beginning at 2pm. It is a wonderfully inspiring event that everyone should attend.

The Rolling Thunder group presents an emotional program with a MIA wall and the local American Legion Auxiliary always treats us with coffee and goodies.

The Woman's Club of Steubenville has reserved a bus that is leaving the Eastern Gateway Community College this year so everyone from the Steubenville area can relax and enjoy the day with a lunch at the Historic Millersburg hotel on the way.

"LEADING THE WAY"

Leadership requires a passion to achieve your goals. A leader without passion isn't a leader, they are a nine to five employee. A true leader works beyond the time necessary to resolve the problem, no matter how much time it takes. Passion drives you to inspire others through your own passion and enthusiasm. Above all, you have got to believe in what you are doing. Cling to the philosophy when you have a new way or idea "if you can conceive it, you can achieve it" in whatever you want to do. Very few leaders become great and effective leaders without first being a follower.

When graduating from nursing school, I thought it would easy to become an effective leader. In my first position as a nurse, I learned very quickly that you need to be a follower. The first head nurse was named Mrs. Gillas. She was a true leader; under her direction the nursing unit ran like clockwork with very few problems. If a patient was unhappy because his food was cold, she would resolve the problem. She was so smooth, in the end, she could tell the patient to go to hell and he would look forward to the trip. I was reassigned to another floor in the hospital and it was in total chaos. All I can say is organized confusion. The head nurse was more concerned about how soon she could leave, no matter what the problem was at that moment to be resolved, she left the floor and went home. She did this even when the patient was unhappy. Subsequently, his anger was directed towards the nurses the entire time of his hospitalization. Finally, she was reassigned to a section working as a staff nurse.

After two years of being a follower, I accepted the head nurse position of the third floor. Using all of the skills that Mrs. Gillas taught me about leadership and providing quality care to our patients, I worked to ensure that the nurses enjoyed their work environment. Our team received a certificate of excellence for our nursing unit from the hospital administration. After four years in the head nurse position, I went to part time to pursue a college degree in Health Care Administration and become a licensed nursing home administrator.

Twelve years later, I met up with Mrs. Gillas again. We were at a seminar acquiring our Continuing Education units required to renew our nursing license. We sat talking during our lunch break and chatted about the many years ago when we first met and how the nursing profession has evolved. She looked at me and smiled. She said "I am so proud of the leader you have become in your pursuit of excellence in the health care field. I knew you had leadership qualities within you when you were a new graduate nurse". She went on to say that we all have the potential to become a great leader; you need passion, commitment and dedication to achieve your goal. Many fail to become effective leaders; they refuse to follow first. Thank you, Mrs. Gillas, for techniques of leadership skills I learned from you by following and observing your style of leadership. I don't think anyone can become a leader instantly. It takes time, patience and the desire to learn. You must be open to suggestions on how to improve and be willing to accept advice.

I followed some great leaders and some very poor leaders over the years. The last poor leader I worked with is what motivated me to go into business. The decision to start my own home health agency at the age of 49 is still a mystery to me, I now refer to it as baptism by fire.

I mortgaged our home and used our life savings to start Heritage Home Care, Inc. When I started, we had two employees. It took five years to become profitable. I paid off the loan on the house, returned and replenished our savings account and now have 135 employees. The agency now serves over 200 patients and we are celebrating our 20th year anniversary. The success of any project requires a leader that sets examples for others. You have to work along side your employees when needed and be willing to do the same task that you ask of them. One of the great rewards is encouraging other women to develop their leadership skills. I mentored three women to successfully open their own home health care agencies. The triumphs have been possible because a leader uses all tools available to help others succeed! Passion, commitment, integrity, tenacity to stay on task, setting examples and sharing knowledge are important tools for leadership. After all, if a leader implements those worthwhile virtues to others, the human spirit can overcome any obstacle that stands in the way of success!

GFWC SIGNATURE PROJECT: DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS and PREVENTION— Lisa Waitkus [lmwaitkus@yahoo.com]

The goal of the GFWC Signature Project: Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention is to increase awareness and prevention of the widespread occurrence of domestic abuse in communities across the nation. The GFWC Signature Project speaks with one voice against abuse of intimate partner abuse, child abuse, teen dating violence, bullying, human trafficking and elder abuse.

Ohio's goal is for 1000 club women to sign a pledge to take a stand against domestic violence. Cards were distributed to take back to the clubs for signatures. Envelopes to mail the collected, signed cards back were also available for District Presidents. There are many ideas for our clubs to spread the word and increase awareness that were presented at Ohio's Information Day. Ohio's craft idea to increase awareness is to make a simple bracelet to distribute or sell for \$1 or \$2. All proceeds to be given to the club's local shelter or to the GFWC Success for Survivors Scholarship. The bracelet can be a hands on project. When selling or distributing the bracelets they can be attached to a card with teen dating violence quick facts. Contact Lisa Waitkus for instructions on making bracelets if you did not receive the instructions at State Information Day. We are also still participating in the Pinwheels for Prevention.

There are three types of Community Service projects for the Signature Project. **Step Away From Abuse** Projects include donations with an attached message of support and encouragement. **Step Up The Comfort** Projects include many items to put together for the comfort of those in the shelters, and would be distributed to the local shelters. They include many creative projects like the purse project, or birthday bags, pajama parties, first night kits, anger kits, and more. **Step Up To The Future** Projects include work with organizations or local shelters to help make a difference by aiding survivors on the road to recovery and into the working world.

GFWC Success for Survivors Scholarship is a \$1000.00 scholarship that is awarded annually in June to up to eight domestic violence survivors to help them pursue their education and career dreams. Your State Co-Chairmen for the GFWC Signature Project are Evelyn Bachman and Lisa Waitkus.

The goal for our Junior Special Project, Advocates for Children, will be to educate, advocate and engage others to become active advocates for children.

There are so many challenges facing children these days they need our help now more than ever. Children with disabilities and their families face challenges every day. PUBLIC ISSUES COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAM—Margaret Resar [mmresar@yahoo.com]

My objective is to connect members with effective projects and activities relating to civic engagement. In the area of <u>Citizenship I</u> would like everyone to increase patriotism and pride in our heritage, (fly your flags, help someone study for their Citizenship test); preserve historic sites, monuments and homes (help with fundraisers, cleaning, etc); participate in the legislative process (help with Candidates nights, discuss the issues and vote, observe National Day of Remembrance and Moment of Remembrance at 3:00 pm on Memorial Day each year and encourage qualified women to seek elected or appointed offices).

An Advocator is a person who speaks, pleads or writes in support of a cause, idea or policy. A GFWC Clubwoman is a person dedicating her time and talents to pursue an issue.

Mixing these two powerful persons, an advocacy in action is formed. More than 100 years of GFWC advocacy has garnered such results as child labor laws, women's suffrage, pure food and drug statutes, rights for people with disabilities and domestic violence programs. Now it is time for us to find new causes that need our attention.

Advocating is a way that clubwomen can make themselves seen and heard in their communities and at state or national levels. Resolutions can be used to advocate for or against an issue. Concerns can be made known by contacting your elected officials and knowing how the legislative process works. Club members can be informed about legislative issues thru a Legislative Committee. Clubs can present programs about pertinent issues which affect women and children. The names and addresses of local, state, and national elected officials can be made

available for club members.

The GFWC Resolutions and the OFWC Resolutions are the foundation of our public policy initiatives and determine our position on legislative issues and subsequent action. They reflect the Federation's consensus on issues of national and international importance. All clubwomen are encouraged to become familiar with the resolutions and use them to advocate for change at local, state, and national levels.

As a nonpartisan 501(c)(3) organization, GFWC may advocate for or against special issues, but by law cannot endorse or oppose candidates. Members can support candidates as individuals, but not on behalf of GFWC.
