## Grant to Federation will help preserve Shrine's "Great Books"

A grant of \$10,600 has been awarded to the GFWC Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs from the NiSource Charitable Foundation (NiSource Gas Transmission & Storage's (NGT&S) Columbia Gas Transmission. The grant, which was announced July 5, will aid in the purchase of museum-quality preservation display cases for the Memorial Forest Shrine, Ohio's War Memorial, located in Mohican-Memorial State Forest, near Loudonville.

"We are so appreciative of this grant to preserve these historical books," Shirley Mitchell, chairman of the Shrine Trustees and member of the Steubenville Woman's Club, explained. "People don't realize what we have here that honors Ohio's war dead. The Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs has the responsibility of preserving this for future generations to enjoy."

### SPECIAL IDEAS FOR CLUBS

EDITOR'S NOTE: Mary Ellen Brock, GFWC secretary and our Convention guest last April, presented a wonderful workshop entitled "The Secret Ingredient." She provided many ideas for programs and projects, which are being printed in The Buckeye.

#### BOOK DISCUSSION-ZING-A MURDER MYSTERY NIGHT.

Buy paperback copies of the same mystery for each member. (They pay you for them.) One member reads the book ahead of time and notes on what page the murderer is revealed. Books are masking-taped from the page before the murderer is revealed to the end of the book, so no one can read the ending unless they break the masking seal. Members read the book to the taped part and come to the meeting dressed as the character they think is the murderer. Group discussions follow, a vote taken, and the book is untaped and the name of the murderer is revealed. Any mystery by Mary Higgins Clark is ideal, as she always has multiple suspects.

**BAKED POTATOES** - Instead of a dinner where everyone makes a dish, bake large potatoes and have each member bring a topping-cheese, bacon, broccoli, butter, sour cream, chives, and so forth.

**GOLDEN BROOM** – Members painted a broom gold and put a big gold bow on it, and what do you think they did with it? The golden broom and a certificate are awarded every month to the town merchant who has the best window/storefront display, and it is exhibited in the window of the merchant for a month. Members rotate as the judges, and the club usually gets some press from this award.

**HOT FLASHES** – For 10 minutes at a meeting, members pass around a turned-on flashlight. When you possess it, you may tell of any new babies, jobs, vacations, etc.—hot flashes!

**BROWN BAG MEETING** - Everyone brings a brown bag with several personal items that tell something about themselves. The bags are exchanged, and the person holding the bag has three guesses whose bag it is. After being identified, the person explains the items.

**BROWN BAG DINNER** – Everyone brings own silverware, glass and plate and part of a dinner in a brown paper bag. After dinner, all goes in brown bag to wash at home, no cleanup.

MATCH THE CLUBWOMAN TO HER MOTHER'S PICTURE - Pictures of members' mothers are displayed, and members guess who her daughter is. Prize to the winner.

CHANGE OR GOOD RIDDANCE TO A PROJECT CAN BE FUN - After your club has decided on the change, maybe to get rid of an old fundraiser or project, have a funeral for this project. Have members come dressed in black and prepare eulogies about the good qualities of the soon to be buried project.

# "In Her Shoes"

(NOTE: Debbie Matheson was the keynote speaker, introducing the topic of domestic violence awareness through role-playing. Below are excerpts of her talk)

Domestic violence does not respect age, gender, socioeconomic status, or education. Domestic violence occurs within families if there is an imbalance of power and control.

One in three women will experience domestic violence at sometime in their life. Nationally 30 percent of families experience domestic violence.

All in society can help support violence and abuse free futures, and we have a moral obligation to stand in the gap for those who are at risk or are being abused. Even in the membership of this group there may be those who have been victimized and survived to move beyond.

Also, at the bottom is the link to Purple Light Nights, a way for the group to participate in the passing of awareness to all who would see and ask about the purple lights in October.

Family Violence and Prevention Center serves those who have experienced Domestic Violence, defined as "when one person's pattern of unhealthy behavior is used to impose and gain power and control over another individual in an intimate relationship."

Trustees, was responsible for developing the grant and facilitating details for receipt of the money.

"Columbia Gas aims to support local organizations who share our commitment to improving the environment

and promoting civic involvement in the communities where we operate," said Victor M. Gaglio, senior vice president of operations for NGT&S. "We are proud to partner with the Ohio Department of Natural Resources and the Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs to help preserve and protect our natural resources, advance education, and honor our veterans."

The Memorial Forest Shrine is dedicated to the memory of 20,000 Ohioans killed in World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War and the Persian Gulf War. The new display cases will permanently house the centerpieces of the shrine, the "great books" in which the names of these individuals are inscribed. The preservation cases have tiles that absorb moisture and pneumatic locked seals that allow less than three percent air exchange in a month, preventing these two great books from further deterioration.
