President's message

New chapter focuses on books & libraries, Shrine, OF & GF projects

Dear OFWC Members,

Thank you for the opportunity and privilege to serve as your State President. I look forward to meeting you at the Fall Conferences.

On July 1, 2010, we begin a new chapter in GFWC/Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs: The 2010-2012 Administration Chapter. I can envision at least four sub-chapters.

1. Enthusiastic support of the GFWC Signature Project, Domestic Violence Awareness.

2. Meaningful advancement of membership and leadership goals.

3. Faithful attendance at our annual pilgrimage with the Gold Star Mothers and continued support of the Shrine.

4. Generous support for this President's Special Emphasis, "Give a book, share a book, and help your libraries."

GFWC SIGNATURE PROJECT— DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS

Two years ago, members of GFWC voted to have a signature project—a project that all members could get behind. Domestic Violence Awareness was chosen because it touches all social and economic levels in all our communities. Convention got us off to an active start by putting kits together for our local shelters. Our keynote speaker made us realize how important we need to make young women aware of the signs of domestic abuse.

A lot of my professional career has been spent representing women in domestic relations court. Early in my career, long before shelters were established, a woman came to our office. She had six children, no job, no family to support her, no high school diploma, and no job skills. She told me she wanted a divorce and was afraid of her husband. It was late Friday afternoon. Back then you could get a restraining order only if the blood was dripping. I told her to come back Monday. There were no shelters then. She did come back on Monday, but she was black and blue all over her face and arms. I took pictures of her and said let's go to court. She said to me, "I can't. I have children and no way to support them. I have to go back to my husband." She left.

MEMBERSHIP/LEADERSHIP

Like many groups we see declining membership. We need to be very aggressive in gaining new members. Rose Logston has consented to be State Membership Chairman, subject to Board approval. We have asked the Past State Presidents to serve as a special task force along with newly installed district presidents, district membership chairmen, and state officers. We need to support whatever this special group asks us to do. While traveling to clubs last fall, Rose asked two questions-why did you join women's club and why do you stay? The answers to those two questions were the same: "To do community service and enjoy friendships." Once we have enthusiastic membership, leadership will not be a problem.

MEMORIAL SHRINE

We need to continue to be supportive of our Memorial Shrine, financially



and with our attendance at the Gold Star Mothers Pilgrimage. Our Shrine was estab-

lished in the 1940s to honor those Ohio men and women who gave their lives for our country. This year's pilgrimage will be Sunday, September 26. We will meet at Loudonville at 2 p.m. to support the Gold Star Mothers and honor their loved ones. We will continue to sell pavers for the walkway. I hope that our clubs will continue to support our troops through Boatsies Boxes and the Fisher House.

Memorial Forest ~ Shrine Report Convention 2010

By SHIRLEY MITCHELL, Chairman of the Shrine Trustees

Tim Humphrey, ODNR Forest Ranger at the Shrine, gave me a wonderful report about what is going on there.

As we all know, general maintenance at the Shrine is an ongoing process. After the big ice storm several years ago at the Shrine, many branches and limbs had to be trimmed. Tim said that the trees on the grounds are now doing beautifully.

The contract for the lawn care is around \$5,000 and will be covered by the Mohican Forest budget. It is provided by Progress Industries, Ashland County MRDD.

The caretaker at the Shrine, Merl Burkhart, whom I met last year at the Shrine along with his wife, continues the daily opening, closing, and cleaning of the Shrine for \$5 a day. He just lives down the road from the Shrine. His service is around \$1,800 per year and is also covered by the Mohican budget

The "Memorial Walkway" has been completed to the Shrine's parking area. The purchase and donation of 10,000 blank brick pavers from the Federation allowed the walkway to be completed. There are also enough blank pavers to allow the forest crew to complete most of the "Friends Walkway" that leads to the "Deceased President's Grove." Tim told me that they planned doing the "Friends Walkway" this summer and hope to have it completed for the Gold Star Mothers Pilgrimage in September. Annually, as the pavers are sold, the blank pavers will be taken up and replaced with the engraved ones.

Rose Logston and Marianne Nave are working with Thompson's Memorials for the purchase of granite benches to be placed along the walkways. Tim is planning for the forest crews to install several cement pads to support these benches, hopefully this summer.

Again this year, the state's budget has been cut by 2.7 million dollars but Tim will submit his request for \$250,000 in capital improvements for upgrades and rehabilitation for the Memorial Shrine.

The repairs and upgrades include repair, replace, and regrout the sandstone walkway and steps, raise the front walkways to eliminate the step, low-pressure wash the walkways and steps, install drain tile, raise the flower beds on each



side of the building, replace the flag pole with a maintenance-free pole, replace display cabinets, purchase and install hardware, software and obtain an internet provider for a web-based database for veterans' names and data.

The Division's commitment to the Shrine remains a high priority, and with the help and support of the Federation, we will keep the Shrine as one of the finest memorials in the nation.

Last year when we were all together, I told you that we had a total of 187 names in our books. We now have a total of 206 names of young men and women who have paid the ultimate price so that you and I could remain free.

The Gold Star Mothers Pilgrimage is September 26, 2010. It is always the last Sunday in September. Attendance is growing each year, and the folks from the American Legion and Tim said they may have to get a bigger tent.
